Activity Ideas:

<u>Pumpkin Life Cycle Bracelets</u>: After discussing how pumpkins grow, help the children make a visual reminder they can wear! Provide the following supplies for each child, then direct them in the correct order of assembly: 1st-GROUND-brown pipe cleaner, 2nd-SEED-light tan bead, 3rd-LEAF-dark green bead; 4th-BLOSSOM-yellow flower bead; 5th-GREEN PUMPKIN-light green bead; 6th-ORANGE PUMPKIN-orange bead. Twist ends of pipe cleaner together, adjusting to fit around the wrist.

<u>Pumpkin Pie Playdough:</u> Mix together 3 cups flour, 1 1/2 cups salt, 2 Tbsp. cream of tartar, 3 cups water, 1 Tbsp. vegetable oil, 1 container (1 1/2 ounces) pumpkin pie spice. Knead dough until smooth. Optional: add a few drops of orange food coloring (2 parts yellow, one part red). Provide small pie-type tins and have the children create pretend pumpkin pies. Don't forget to show them how to pinch around the edges to make the crust! <u>thevirtualvine.com</u>

<u>Fall Shaker Fun:</u> The sensory bottles can be used for a discovery center or an accompaniment to fall-themed songs. Place loose feed corn, acorns, and pumpkin seeds in a small clean soda bottle.
