

Activity Ideas:

<u>Sweet Observations</u>: Pudding is the perfect snack to encourage little ones to use a variety of senses. Give each child an unopened pudding cup and a spoon and guide them in following these steps: 1. Shake the cup. Discuss the sound it makes. 2. Open the cup and look at the pudding. Discuss how the pudding looks, being sure to notice the color and texture. 3. Smell the pudding. Discuss the scent of the pudding and what flavor it might be. 4. Taste the pudding. Discuss the flavor of the pudding and whether it matches the flavor predicted during Step 3.

<u>Texture Collages</u>: Provide bits and pieces of a variety of materials for children to glue onto a piece of heavy paper; as they work, discuss how each material feels. Some ideas to get started: fabrics (satin, velvet, corduroy, lace), ribbon, sandpaper, foil, corrugated paper (bulletin board borders) or cardboard, carpet, dish scrubbies, cotton balls, bubble wrap, egg shells.




