Activity Ideas:

<u>Antler Headbands</u>: For antlers, trace child's hands onto cardstock and cut out. Cut a two-inch wide strip of paper the measurement around the child's head plus two inches; adjust the fit of the headband and staple at the overlap. Attach antlers on opposite sides of the headband.

<u>Deer Ears</u>: Ahead of time, prepare deer ears for each child—use sharp scissors to cut one end of empty paper towel or toilet paper tubes at an angle (two per child). Explain that deer have a highly developed sense of hearing; their large ears are constantly scanning their environment. Each ear can work independently of the other. They have "surround sound"! Demonstrate holding the flat end of the tube over each ear, then using the "deer ears" to listen to environmental sounds. Compare the sounds heard with and without the "deer ears".

<u>Wintry Woodland</u>: Fill your sensory table with straw or sand. Add items such as real evergreen twigs, medium-size rocks, pinecones, moss, and plastic woodland animals. Encourage children to explore and describe the textures of the woodland. *Mailbox Magazine, Preschool Edition Dec/Jan 2011-12*

Road to Reading Tip:

Ask a question and WAIT! It is sometimes hard to remember that children take longer to process questions and formulate answers than adults. Before providing an answer, wait five seconds after asking a question. allowing time for the child to process what has been asked and to give you an answer (even it is not the expected engine). This technique will help shildren process their
